Video	 Closed captions are optimal as the text appears over the video Text transcripts are the baseline tool to provide alternate access to audio Use a video player that has control buttons that are accessible for screen readers 	Short link for video check:1.usa.gov/1zHsMVR
Images	 Use design guidelines (color, resolution, animation) when creating images Put a short text description under the image Use alternative text for images, i.e. HTML alt tag of the image Attach a text file with an extensive or long description of the image 	 Link for designing images: bit.ly/1Hgdu28 Link for using images: bit.ly/1IUHtT4
Audio	 Provide a text based file that has all of the content of the audio file Include notes such as [music] to portray music is playing or [laughing] to relay that the person is laughing Transcripts can contain additional information such as descriptions, explanations, or comments to help hard of hearing/deaf users to better understand the content 	Link for audio check:bit.ly/1ObPnWj
W P P	 Apply heading styles and paragraph formatting to your document. Add alternative text to images, objects and tables. Structure layout tables for easy navigation Use hyperlink text that is meaningful Avoid using blank cells, rows, or columns for formatting Run through accessibility checker 	 Create Accessible Word Documents bit.ly/1H8HDQU Create Accessible PowerPoints bit.ly/1bdPDIHs Create Accessible Excel Files bit.ly/1O8icmu
